A. INTRODUCTION

Conference Attainment

Edo Conference of SDA Church was carved out of the defunct Edo – Delta Conference that existed since February 2, 2002, with headquarters at 174 Old Benin-Agbor Road, Benin – City, Edo State. It initially covered the two states of Edo and Delta, and was previously part of the then North-Western Nigeria Union Mission (NWNUM), with headquarters in Maryland, Lagos. The journey to conference status actually began in earnest on February 25, 2011 at the Triennial Constituency Session of the defunct Edo – Delta Conference (EDC), where counsel of the Union (NWNUM) administration that EDC be reorganized on state basis, ie., Edo and Delta states. The consequent emergency Mini - Constituency of June 28, 2011, where the idea of state conferences was overwhelmingly supported and endorsed by the delegates in session. Edo Administrative Unit was thus inaugurated on December 31, 2011 at COMAC and against all odds and to the glory of God, when the survey Team visited from Abidjan for inspection on August 21, 2012, and Edo Administrative Unit scaled through. At the beginning of the Edo Administrative Unit, three leaders were appointed to actualize the conference status, and these included Pastor Mike A. Senne- Aya (President), Pastor Gab. A. Umhebaita (Executive Secretary) and Elder Edwin O. Okoro (Treasurer). The erstwhile EDC Officers in 2011 included Pastor Michael A. Senne-Aya (President), Pastor Gab. A. Umhebaita (Secretary) and Elder Daniel Edafe (Treasurer). Edo Administrative Unit began with nineteen personnel, which included 3 administrators, 4 office workers and 12 field pastors.

Within 12 months of experimentation and trial period, conference status was attained on December 27, 2012 where Edo Conference was inaugurated at COMAC. On December 29, 2012, the inaugural programme and dedication of the officers, including directors and the Executive Committee were done.
